The Frazier Prize Debate at the University of Pennsylvania was held last Friday evening. The Frazier prizes in debating are \$75 for the first man and \$25 for second best. The three highest in this debate represent Pennsy in the Michigan-Pennsylvania debate to be held at Ann Arbor on March 8.

The question discussed was the same as for the intercollegiate debate: "Resolved That United States Senators Should be Elected by Popular Vote."

M. D. Veasey, '02 L, Bruce A. Metzger, '01 L, and Claude L. Roth, '02, will represent Pennsylvania, with Thos. G. Parkinson, '02 L, alternate. The contest was considered one of the most successful in recent years, both the matter of argument and manner of presentation being exceptionally good.
